CHRIST THE HUMBLE KING

An American soldier on a bus in Sweden told the man sitting next to him, "America is the most democratic country in the world. Ordinary citizens may go to the White House to see the President and discuss things with him."

The man said, "That's nothing. In Sweden, the king and the people travel on the same bus."

When the man got off the bus at the next stop, the American was told by other passengers that he had been sitting next to King Gustav Adolf VI.

Today, we celebrate the feast of Christ the King, although 'King' is a word we rarely use to describe Jesus. 'King' is a word associated with power, and Jesus did not use that kind of power. Regardless of that, Jesus is a king because he has a kingdom, the values for which are service and humility. Kings usually carry out important functions like receiving important people and dignitaries but Jesus received the lowly and rejected people of his time. A king accepts valuable gifts, but Jesus gave gifts; he restored health to those who were sick. Jesus is nothing like the kings of our earthly kingdom who may distance themselves from the common man. Jesus is always close to us: He walks by our side, he lifts us up when we need help, and he has even given the ultimate sacrifice by giving his life for us.

I conclude with an excerpt from a beautiful hymn in Paul's letter to the Philippians 2:9-11:

*"God has highly exalted him,
and bestowed on him the name which is above every name,
that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow,
in heaven and on earth and under the earth.
And every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord,
to the glory of God the Father."*
